Master's Programme Linguistik (M.A. Linguistics)

§ 1 The study programme

The Master's Programme *Linguistics* is aimed at graduates of linguistic or philological bachelor's programmes. Students expand and deepen their analytical linguistic knowledge and skills in one of the following areas: General Linguistics, English Linguistics, German Linguistics, Romance Linguistics or Slavic Linguistics.

§ 2 Required Credits

The Master's Programme *Linguistics* consists of 7 Modules. It comprises 120 ECTS¹-Credits (cr). 54 cr must be completed in the area of general linguistics (Module 1-2 and 7) and 66 cr in an area of specialisation (Module 3-6).

§ 3 Course content

The subject of the programme is the theoretical description and analysis of linguistic structures and their formalisation. The Master's Programme *Linguistics* provides the necessary knowledge and skills to pursue an academic career and/or to deal professionally with theoretical and practical linguistic issues and to practise language-centred professions.

The course imparts analytical and methodical competence and, depending on the focus, deepening in the synchronic and/or diachronic analysis of one or more languages. Good knowledge of English is required (level B2). A stay abroad at a university outside of Germany is desirable (creditable in module 6).

In the field of linguistics, seminars on other linguistic topics can be taken. In the field of neighbouring areas, seminars on other subjects such as literature, art, media, psychology, philosophy, computer science, mathematics and statistics can be taken. Any language other than English can be chosen as language practice, including German as a second or subsequent language; the key qualification courses must be creditable for master's programmes. A semester abroad is desirable. The recommended period for this is the 2nd and/or 3rd semester. The module is completed when 21 cr have been obtained.

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§ 3.3 Area of specialisation *English Linguistics*

The area of specialisation *English Linguistics* has a linguistic focus on English and is concerned with variation and the acquisition of the English language system. The teaching and examination language is usually English.

In the field of linguistics, seminars on other linguistic topics can be taken. In the field of neighbouring areas, seminars on other subjects such as literature, art, media, psychology, philosophy, computer science, mathematics and statistics can be taken. English should be chosen as the language of language practice; the key qualification courses must be creditable for master's programmes. A semester abroad in an English-speaking country is desirable. The recommended period for this is the 2nd and/or 3rd semester. The module is completed when 21 cr have been obtained.

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§ 4 Programme Structure

§ 5 Languages of instruction and examination

Courses are held in German, English or one of the studied languages. The examination language can be German, English or one of the studied languages.

§ 6 Master's Examination

- (1) Students have to complete the course-related performance assessments specified in § 2 in the modules 1 to 7.
- (2) Final examination

In addition to the module unit examinations, a final examination (Module 8) in the core area is required:

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- 1. Master's thesis in accordance with § 22 of the Study and Examination Regulations for the Master of Arts Programmes. Students have to complete the thesis within four months and have to show that they are able to work independently according to scientific principles in a limited field (18 cr). The master's thesis is written in German, English or one of the studied languages.
- 2. Oral examination (3 credits, 30 minutes)

The final oral examination includes a colloquium on the topic of the master's thesis and an examination of the linguistic basics. It is held in German, English or one of the studied languages.

§ 7 Calculation of the final grade

The final grade is calculated as follows:

Grades for each of the modules 1 through 5 are calculated as the average of the grades from the relevant module units weighted by the number of ETCS credits awarded for each unit.

The grades for modules 1 through 5 and module 7 count towards the final grade and are weighted according to the corresponding number of ECTS credits for each module.

The grade for module 7 is calculated as follows: The grade for the master's thesis is multiplied by three; the grade for the oral examination is not multiplied.

Modules 6 does not count towards the final grade.

§ 8 Effective Date

- (1) These examination regulations come into effect on 1st October 2017.
- (2) The changes as of 11 March 2021 come into effect on 1st April 2021.
- (3) Students who began their studies before the new regulations came into effect continue their studies according to the regulations that were previously valid for them.
